

Number of Players Three Eyed Snake requires at least two players, with a general maximum of eight players. Theoretically, there is no maximum number.


Three Dice, Two Rounds Every player must have three dice. There are two rounds where all players roll their dice. First round, everyone rolls all three dice. If you didn't get a six or a one, you can pick up the "bad dice" and try to do better in round two. If your dice are great, you don't have to pick up anything.

Note: No player can roll in round two until ALL players have chosen what dice they are keeping and what they are going to re-roll.

Pix these up and roll them in round two.

Round One








A player has rolled a six, a one, and a three. Generally, you'd keep the six, pick up the other two dice and try to get more sixes in round two.

Round Two









Who Wins After round two, if the leading rollers have the same amount of sixes or have a three eyed snake, the round is a wash. No bet carries over. Everyone ties. If your dice are shit, you will find yourself rooting for anyone to tie the leader. If anyone at the table has more sixes or a three eyed snake, they win.

Betting Traditional stakes are "one dollar". That is generally the announced wager. For every six rolled on the leaders dice, it's a dollar. If you win with three sixes, it's three dollars. If the leading player has three sixes and you have two, it doesn't matter. There is no "discount" or subtraction there. You lost and three sixes wins 3x the bet, three dollars. If you hit a snake, that is 5x the bet, five dollars. This is collected from EVERY player at the table.
